The two become one flesh.

A reading from the book of Genesis.

- 7 The Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life,
- 8 and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it.
- 18 Then the Lord God said,
 "It is not good that the man should be alone;
 I will make him a helper as his partner."
- 19 So out of the ground the Lord God formed every animal of the field and every bird of the air, and brought them to the man to see what he would call them; and whatever the man called every living creature, that was its name.
- The man gave names to all cattle, and to the birds of the air, and to every animal of the field; but for the man there was not found a helper as his partner.

Second Reading - Mark 10.2-16

What God has joined together, let no one separate.

A reading from the holy gospel according to Mark.

- 2 Some Pharisees came, and to test Jesus they asked, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?"
- 3 Jesus answered them, "What did Moses command you?"
- They said,
 "Moses allowed a man to write a certificate of dismissal and to divorce her."
- 5 But Jesus said to them,
 "Because of your hardness of heart
 he wrote this commandment for you.
- 6 But from the beginning of creation, 'God made them male and female.'
- 7 'For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife,
- 8 and the two shall become one flesh.'
 So they are no longer two, but one flesh.
- 9 Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate."
- 10 Then in the house the disciples asked him again about this matter.
- Jesus said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her;
- 12 and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery." *
- 13 People were bringing little children to him in order that Jesus might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them.
- 14 But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them: for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs.
- 15 Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it."

16 And Jesus took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them.

May your Word live in us.

THE CREEDS

What is the core of Christian belief in greater depth, as shown through the Nicene and Apostles' Creeds? Six sessions aim to provide a framework for discussion about the creeds of the Christian Church.

- Session 1 explores what it could mean to say: "I believe" and "We believe" and the
 potential role for the creeds to strengthen our relationship with God.
- **Session 2** explores what it means to understand God as Trinity: one God in three persons.
- **Sessions** 3 and 4 take us deeper in our understanding of Jesus and look at the way Christ is fully God and fully human and at the great work of redemption on the cross.
- Session 5 explores the person and work of the Holy Spirit
- **Session 6** explores what it is to be called 'the Church.'
