





ORGAN POSTLUDE

Fugue from Toccata and Fugue in D Minor (BWV 565) by J.S. Bach (1685-1750)

Liturgy Words:

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MUSIC PROGRAMME NOTES

Prelude : Canon in D Major by Johann Pachelbel (1653-1706)

Pachelbel as a composer was an intermediary between the southern and northern tendencies of German baroque music and is universally considered as a link to the works of J.S. Bach. Originally scored for three violins and a *basso continuo* the piece is today inescapably linked to the pianoforte. In its original form the piece combines the techniques of canon - a polyphonic device in which the three violin voices play the same music, entering in sequence - but there is also a fourth voice, the basso continuo, which plays an independent ostinato part.

Motet : Ave Verum Corpus (K618) by W.A. Mozart (1756-1791) (St. Bart's only)

This beloved motet was composed in 1791 in the small spa town of Baden near Vienna as his wife Constanze, expecting their sixth child, was ill and was "taking the waters". Completed just six months before his death, it was written for four voices (SATB) in quite simple form. The key is D Major. The text is attributed to Pope Innocent I. The theme has been used by Liszt and Tchaikovsky in various pieces as a tribute to Mozart.

Postlude : Fugue from Toccata and Fugue in D Minor (BWV 565) by J.S. Bach (1685-1750)

This piece is often referred to as the best-known piece of organ music ever written. Often over-dramatized and unfairly maligned, its history is interesting. Bach was notorious for not indicating key signatures, tempo markings or preferred stop registrations and this has led some scholars to suggest that a lack of key signature implied that Bach intended the piece to be written in the mode of 'D Dorian' rather than 'D Minor' - the main difference between the two modes being that in D Dorian there are no accidentals – it's virtually a C Major scale but starting on a D. I'm not sure that this suggestion is correct as the piece itself abounds in B flats and C sharps all consistent with the more traditional mode of D Minor. But it is interesting that in the manuscript I am using – considered to be the most up-to-date authoritative version – there are no flats in the key signature.

The subject of the four-voice fugue is made up entirely of sixteenth notes, with an implied pedal point set against a brief melodic subject that first falls, then rises. Such violin-like figures are frequently encountered in Baroque music and that of Bach, both as fugue subjects and as material in non-imitative pieces. Unusually, the answer is in the subdominant key, rather than the traditional dominant. In today's shortened version, I have excluded the extra modulation into C minor. So we remain within the D minor and G minor modes throughout. Although technically a four-part fugue, most of the time there are only three voices, and some of the interludes are in two, or even one voice (notated as two). Although only simple triadic harmony is employed throughout the fugue, there is an unexpected solo pedal statement of the subject—a unique feature for a Baroque fugue. Immediately after the final subject entry, the fugue resolves to a sustained Bb major chord. A multi-sectional coda follows, marked *Recitativo*. Although only 17 bars long, it progresses through five tempo changes. The last bars are played *Molto Adagio*, and the piece famously ends with a minor plagal cadence.
