

First Reading – Exodus 34.29-35

A reading from the book of Exodus.

- Moses came down from Mount Sinai.

 As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God.
- When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him.

Second Reading - 2 Corinthians 3.12-4:2

A reading from the second letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

- 12 Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness,
- not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside.
- 14 But their minds were hardened.
 Indeed, to this very day,
 when they hear the reading of the old covenant,
 that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside.
- Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds;
- but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed.





MUSIC NOTES

Prelude: "Now Thank we All Our God" (Marche Triomphale) by Sigfrid Karq-Elert (1877-1933) Op. 65 No. 13.

Karg-Elert was born Siegfried Theodor Karg in Oberndorf am Neckar, Germany. His family settled in Leipzig in 1882 where Siegfried received his first musical training and private piano instruction. At a gathering of composers in Leipzig he presented his first attempts at composition to the composer Emil von Reznicek, who arranged a three-year tuition-free scholarship at the Leipzig Conservatory. From August 1901 to September 1902, he worked as a piano teacher in Magdeburg. It was during this

period that he changed his name to Sigfrid Karg-Elert, adding a variant of his mother's maiden name to his surname, and adopting the Swedish spelling of his first name.

He returned to Leipzig and started devoting himself to composition, primarily for the piano (encouraged by Edvard Grieg, whom he greatly admired) and in 1904 he met the Berlin publisher Carl Simon who introduced him to the harmonium. From then on until his death he created one of the most significant and extensive catalogues of original works for this instrument. Encouraged by the organist Paul Homeyer, he reworked several harmonium compositions for pipe organ, before composing his first original pipe organ piece "66 Chorale Improvisations" (Op. 65) in 1909. It is from this work that today's Prelude is derived.

The cultural climate in Germany in the 1920s and 1930s was very hostile to the internationally oriented and French-influenced Karg-Elert - although his works were admired outside Germany, especially in the U.K. (the Organ Music Society of London held a twelve-day festival in his honour in 1930, which he attended) and in the United States, in his home country his music was almost completely neglected. All this led to him accepting an invitation for an organ concert tour of America in the spring of 1932. The tour proved to be a disastrous mistake due to his heavy smoking, neuralgia and heart failure. Moreover, he was suffering from diabetes which would soon kill him and his limited powers as an organist compared unfavourably to the virtuoso standard of organ performance.

After his return to Leipzig his health started deteriorating rapidly. He died there in April 1933, aged just 55. The popularity of his compositions declined for a period after World War II before a successful revival in the late 1970s - today his works for the pipe organ are frequently included in recitals.

Karg-Elert regarded himself as an outsider. Notable influences in his work include composers Johann Sebastian Bach (he often used the BACH motif in Bach's honour), Edvard Grieg, Claude Debussy, Max Reger, Alexander Scriabin, and Arnold Schoenberg. In general terms, his musical style can be characterised as being lateromantic with impressionistic and expressionistic tendencies. His profound knowledge of music theory allowed him to stretch the limits of traditional harmony without losing tonal coherence.

His favourite instruments for composition were the Kunstharmonium and the pipe organ. He also composed for small ensembles or the piano, including vocal music. His music for flute became very popular during his lifetime. Surprisingly, he also took a considerable interest in the saxophone.

Anthem – "O Nata Lux" by Morten Lauridsen (1943-present)

Morten Lauridsen is considered one of America's most important composers of choral music and his O Nata Lux (O Born of Light) is considered the definitive contemporary setting of that text. This piece comes from a larger work, Lux Aeterna,

set in quasi-Renaissance style, with serene, chant-like chordal sections interwoven with sections of polyphony.

Originally composed in the 16th century by Thomas Tallis, the words are singularly appropriate for Transfiguration Sunday:

O Light born of Light,

Jesus, redeemer of the world,

with loving-kindness deign to receive

suppliant praise and prayer.

Thou who once deigned to be clothed in flesh

for the sake of the lost,

grant us to be members

of thy blessed body.

Mostly performed a capella, we are presenting this anthem today simply with piano accompaniment and in an extremely close and intimate setting. We shall sing the anthem in Latin as this language best suits the metre of the piece.

Postlude: Opus 6 No. 5 of "Ten Voluntaries for Organ" (1752) by John Stanley (1712-1786) Like the great Johann Sebastian Bach, Stanley was better known in his lifetime as a performer rather than a composer. But he achieved an almost Handel-like status by the time he died. There was general agreement that he should be buried in Westminster Abbey in the company of Purcell and Handel, but in his will, he requested that he should be buried beside his wife at St. Andrew's, Holborn. Although rendered virtually blind at the age of 2 in an unfortunate domestic accident, when he was just fourteen years' old, he was chosen as organist at St Andrew's, Holborn, and at the age of seventeen became the youngest person ever to obtain the Bachelor of Music degree (B.Mus.) from the University of Oxford. In 1734 he was appointed organist to the Society of the Inner Temple, a position which he held until his death in 1786. It was at the ancient Temple Church that his brilliant playing on both the organ and harpsichord attracted the attention of many fine musicians including George Frideric Handel, who regularly visited the church just to hear him. Stanley was also an outstanding violinist.

Although known as a *Trumpet Voluntary*, this piece was never intended to be played on a trumpet. It was written by an organist for the pipe organ. As it was probably composed for two manuals without a pedalboard, and it is often played at a rather brisk tempo which I feel tends to detract from the majesty of the piece. Played at a stately tempo, the piece shines as an example of baroque music with clearly a fine solo line but also featuring beautifully written inner voices singing strong harmonies. The addition in this arrangement of a featured pedalboard permits the departure from the almost constant use of the tonic and experimenting with some chords in their first and second inversions for dramatic effect. A slower tempo also serves to feature this voicing. Hence the argument that 21st century arrangers can enhance 17th century composition!





ABOUT MICHAEL WOOD

Active Listening Project Officer

I was born in Adelaide and did my schooling there. At the age of seventeen I commenced (and completed) a cadetship in the shipping industry with the Australian National Line. This involved study at the Australian Maritime College and time at sea. I then spend five years in the ANL office in Melbourne and did a Business Degree (HR) at Victoria College, before marrying Rani and moving to live in Perth in 1990. After a couple of years working for Bankwest in Human Resource Management, I commenced theology studies at Murdoch University. I was ordained priest in the Anglican Diocese of Perth in 1996.



After ten years in parish ministry, I now share my working life between being Anglican Chaplain to the University of WA, and working in private practice as a leadership coach and circle-facilitator. Our two adult daughters have left home and one of them lives in Melbourne. Rani,

who normally works as a lay hospital chaplain, has commenced postgraduate studies in spirituality at Melbourne University of Divinity and will be doing some part time pastoral work at a network of Uniting Churches in Melbourne. We are very grateful to have lined up a house-swap with a couple in Carlton.

My theology has been influenced by Eastern Orthodox and nonviolent theologies. As we are drawn by the Holy Spirit into the life of God (Trinity), and participate in the embodied life of Christ, we are liberated, transformed, forgiven and renewed. We are being delivered, day by day, from rivalry, addiction, violence and everything that degrades human flourishing. This is the 'good news' story we are entrusted with and live by grace. God is really good because "God is Christlike, in whom there is no un-Christlikeness at all" (Michael Ramsey). This is all gift – we do nothing to achieve or deserve it. God's love for humanity is irrevocable and, in the end, God will achieve God's

Shalom on earth as in heaven, in, with, and even in despite of us. As Christians we celebrate, witness to, and live in this pattern of God's kenotic, dying, self-emptying love for the world.

I believe that a significant part of the way we experience God's shalom is through listening and dialogue. Circle processes are a particularly effective way of this this. As we listen and seek to empty ourselves in love towards others and the future which God is bringing about, we begin to communally discern where God is leading us. This includes listening widely (not just to those we would normally connect with); paying attention to surprising 'coincidences'; and emerging patterns of new life. He studied Law at Monash University between 1972-1976 and graduated with degrees in Law and Arts. He practiced law with Minter Ellison (formerly Ellison Hewison and Whitehead) from 1977 and

was promoted to the position of Associate Partner in 1978. In 1980 he decided to discontinue full-time law practice and to engage in the fields of music direction, music composition and arranging. Throughout this time and until the present he has maintained his legal practicing certificate and continues to practice law on a part-time basis. Credits as Musical Director/Supervisor, Orchestrations and Arranger include Broadway "The Last Word" at the Duke Theatre, 42nd Street in July 2016, others include "Dirty Dancing" (Hamburg, 2006-2008), London West End (2006-2011 and 2013), Toronto, Utrecht, Chicago, Boston, Los Angeles, Berlin, Oberhausen, Stockholm, German National Tour, Paris, US Tour (2014- 2018) and UK Tour (2011-2017), "The Australian Outback Spectacular" (2006-2010) for Warner Village Theme Parks, "The Full Monty" (2003 Australia), "Singin' in the Rain" (2001 Australia and Asia), "The Man from Snowy River Arena Spectacular" (2001/2002 Australia), "Jolson" (1999/2000 Australia), "Me and My Girl" (1994-1996 Australia and New Zealand), "The New Rocky Horror Show" (1992 Australia and Asia), "Blues in the Night" (1991 Australia), "Nine" (1987-1988 Australia), "Me and My Girl" (1986 Australia), "Songbook" (Australia), "As You Like It" (Melbourne Theatre Company 1984). Awards - ARIA awards as Musical Director and Producer for the best cast albums for both "Nine" (1989) and

"The Man from Snowy River Arena Spectacular" (2003), Green Room Award as Best Musical Director ("The Man from Snowy River") in 2003. Discography - he has also produced the cast albums for all international productions of "Dirty Dancing" since 2006. His work on the albums of "Nine" (1989) and "The Man from Snowy River Arena Spectacular" (2003) have resulted in ARIA awards for best albums and general excellence.

BRIAR GOESSI Co-Director of Music

Briar was born in New Zealand and at an early age taught herself piano, began studying violin at age 11 and went on to forge a career as a violinist, studying and working in NZ, Belgium, UK and Australia and Canada.

Beginning violin studies at University of Auckland at age 13 she gained a Dip Mus (Perf) and subsequently won a full scholarship to study at the Royal Conservatoire de Musique in Brussels (Belgium). There she won the Premier Prix in Violon and in Musique de Chambre.



While in Brussels she worked in orchestras and moonlighted as an organist at the Maison Notre-Dame de la Providence.

She received a full scholarship to continue post grad studies with Eli Goren in UK at the Royal College of Music (Manchester).

Upon returning home to NZ she worked as Associate Concertmaster with the Auckland Philharmonia before moving to Australia to

continue studies with the Russian soloist Nelli Shkolonikova

She held a position in the first violins in the Melbourne Symphony before moving back to the UK where she had a position with the Orchestra of the Royal Opera House Covent Covent Garden and worked as a casual with the London Symphony Orchestra.

Back in Australia once again she had a job as Principal First Violin in the State Orchestra of Victoria briefly and then worked as a casual with The Melbourne Symphony Orchestra for many years while parenting.

She developed an interest in period instrument performance and played with Australian Romantic and Classical Orchestra when it was founded, performed annually at the Woodend Winter Arts Festival and for many years was the leader of the Bach Cantata program at St John's Lutheran church which is one of the few churches internationally who present the Bach cantata series on original instruments within the liturgical calendar.

After 2 years as organist with St Peter & Paul's in South Melbourne she is delighted to be working as co-director of music, organist and concert co-ordinator at Richmond Anglican Church. She is developing a new concert series which premiers on April 7 with a performance of Haydyn's profoundly beautiful string quartet version of "Die Worte des Erlosers am Kreuze" (The Seven Last Words on the Cross).

The musicians are Cameron Jamieson (violin), Meg Cohen (violin), Simon Oswell (viola) and Rosanne Hunt (cello) and we look forward to welcoming this stellar cast of musicians to open the concert series.
