

THE CREED


THE GREAT THANKSGIVING




THE LORD'S PRAYER





The Advent Wreath

In the northern hemisphere, the Advent-Christmas season occurs when there is a shortage of flowers and so greenery has always figured very largely in the decorations for this season of Advent. Hence, the many references in carols to sweet-scented greens, yew and pine-logs and fir branches, etc. If you have ever kept Christmas in the north, you will recall the sweet and heady scent of these fragrant green branches in churches during this season.

A wreath is made and stood or suspended in the church to remind us by these evergreens of the eternal and ceaseless love of God that is ever fresh and never changes. On each Sunday in Advent, a purple candle is lit as a way of reminding us of the onward march of time. As we draw near to the Feast of Christmas, so we are drawing near, each one of us, to the fulfilment of our own time of destiny.

Christians believe that the whole of Creation is advancing in God's purposes and plan towards fulfilment and perfection. The central white candle therefore signifies this perfection and, when lit on Christmas Day, it is a sign of the fulfilment already of God's promise to us in the birth of Jesus Christ.

The wreath remains in place until the end of the Christmas season, usually about February 2nd, the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

Weekly Reflection: Advent – a time of hope.

Dear Friends of St Bart's,

It is said that while there is life, there is hope. This has even a deeper meaning in reverse: while there is hope, there is life. Hope comes first; life follows on.

Hope gives power to life, for hope is strength. The amount of energy in the world is equal to the amount of hope in it.

Hope sheds light into millions of despairing hearts. It is the miracle medicine of the mind. It inspires the will to live. It is a doctor's most powerful ally. It is a shield against defeat and failure. It never sounds the retreat. It revives ideals and renews dreams. As long as there is hope, no situation is impossible.

Advent summons us to wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Saviour Jesus Christ.

In the final analysis, Christ is our only hope.

Icons as a Guide to Advent – Dr Alison Asquith, PhD

A previous Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams has written two beautiful and accessible books on understanding and praying with icons: *Ponder These Things: Praying with Icons of the Virgin** and *The Dwelling of the Light: Praying with Icons of Christ.* These books offer brief meditative and instructional reflections on a series of popular icons. For example, Williams explains how the icons are painted with a certain perspective to draw our eyes to a certain place on the icon – and how they help us recover our spiritual focus. Williams uses close-up images of the icons to explain the fine points of the meaning behind the colours, symbols, and composition of the icon.

Throughout these books there are insightful observations about the life of faith. For instance, as he writes about the Eleousa Icon (*Virgin of Loving Kindness*), the baby presses against Mary's cheek as she looks out at the viewer. He reflects on the heavy burden that Mary will now bear as the Mother of God's Son. Even amidst the expectancy of Advent, we are reminded that our journey leads to the cross.

Williams has used each of these books on icons in adult small group gatherings in Advent. Each book lends itself to a four-week long small group gathering for the season. Participants were asked to read each chapter before the discussion. Icons and candles were placed around the room. Each session began with quiet prayer and then moved into the discussion. Williams' style in each book is extremely accessible and provocative.

Here at St Bart's, we could use the icons of the first book, *Ponder These Things*, in a similar way as well as using the images for our bulletin cover. In individual devotion, each icon *(there are four)* could be contemplated as Williams suggests over the four weeks in Advent. It could be that Rowan Williams' thoughts and ideas may change us and even enrich our observance of the season of Advent.
