Foreword

This evening's celebration of Lessons and Carols stems from the famous Kings College Chapel's annual Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols, broadcast each year on Christmas Eve. It has been adapted for use by many churches since it was first held at Kings College in 1918. Not surprisingly, there are many traditions associated with such a venerable institution as this Festival. Since 1919, it has been common practice at Kings to begin with the hymn "Once in royal David's City" and the first verse of that hymn is often sung by a chorister who is chosen at the very last minute, so that he doesn't have the time to get nervous.

There was in fact an earlier service, beginning in 1880 in Truro, drawn from ancient sources by E.W. Benson, later Archbishop of Canterbury and described by his son as *"a little service for Christmas Eve"* – nine carols and nine tiny lessons that were read by various officers of the Church, beginning with a chorister and ending with a Bishop reading the final lesson. That tradition still continues at Kings College.

The lessons and prayers provide the backbone of the service from year to year but the music is always a mixture of old and new.

The closing lines of the old traditional Bidding Prayer, *"let us remember those who rejoice with us, but upon another shore and in greater light"* must have spoken poignantly to those at the first service in 1918, remembering their recent war dead, but they are certainly no less meaningful today. Earlier in the same prayer, the people are asked to pray for the mission of the Church in this country and this city. We here at St Bart's have moulded the service of Lessons and Carols to fit our own parish worship but, however it is adapted, the opening Bidding Prayer, the lessons and the music all try to connect us to a Story that has shaped us all.

Seventh Lesson

Eighth Lesson

The Gospel of Matthew 2: 1-12 The wise men are led by the star to Jesus.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.' When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for

Ninth Lesson

The essential witness of faith can be stated quite simply. A Light we can bear to look at, comes to us from a Light we cannot bear to look at even whilst we worship it.

The mystery of Reality enters history very gently by a human channel, and shows the character of Perfect Love within the life of man; gives us something to hold on to, a Truth which is also a Way and a Life.

What we see is not very sensational: but if ye look at it steadily, it pierces the heart. First we see a baby, and a long hidden growth; and then the unmeasured outpouring and self-spending of an other-worldly love and mercy, teaching, healing, rescuing and transforming, but never trying to get anything for itself.

And when we look deeper, we see beyond this a mysterious selfimparting, and a more mysterious anguish and struggle; consummated at last in the most generous and lonely of deaths, issuing in a victory which has given life ever since to men's souls.

Through this vivid life – what Christ does and how He does it, His prayer, His compassionate healing action. His use of suffering, His communion with God and man – the light of Reality floods our twilit inner lives; showing us the human transfigured by the Divine. This is what St. Ignatius Loyola intended and desired when he taught his pupils to 'contemplate the Mysteries of the Life of Christ.'

Few people do it properly. They are too anxious to get on and be practical: for the lesson of the one thing needful is a lesson which human nature instinctively resists.

Yet we shall make our own small work of art all the better if we soak our souls in that beauty first.
