

THE WORD

First Reading

Genesis 2.7-9, 16-18,2-5; 3.1-7

The creation and the sin of our first parents.

A reading from the book of Genesis.

The Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being. And the Lord God planted a garden in Eden, in the east; and there he put the man whom he had formed. Out of the ground the Lord God made to grow every tree that is pleasant to the sight and good for food, the tree of life also in the midst of the garden, and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. And the Lord God commanded the man, "You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die." Then the Lord God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper as his partner.' And the man and his wife were both naked, and were not ashamed. Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden'?" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die." But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." The Creed





Election of new Synod Parish Representatives and Alternate Representative

The Archbishop's Mandate has been received for the election of Lay Representatives for the 54th Melbourne Synod, whose first session will be held later this year. There needs to be an election of two Synod representatives and one Synod alternate representative from St Bartholomew's. The election will be held on **19 March, immediately following Mass.** Nomination papers for Synod representatives and an alternate representative are available at the back of the church, on the table with the Worship Bulletins.

Nominations close immediately before Mass on 12 March and need to be placed in the hands of the Acting Vicar.

If the nominations equal the number required (two Synod representatives, and one alternate Synod representative) then no election will be required. If more nominations than vacancies are received, then the election proceeds immediately after Mass on 19 March. This will be by secret ballot.

If anyone wishes to participate in the election and they are not currently on the electoral roll, they need to obtain a form from the Hon. Parish Secretary, Dr Muriel Porter.

Acting Vicar

Fr Walter McEntee is a highly experienced locum vicar, having faithfully served in this role in a number of parishes over the past ten years. A church historian and former theological lecturer, he brings a wealth of knowledge of the church to his role. A priest since 1968, he has served as a chaplain in hospitals and schools, and continues as the chaplain to the Diocese's Anglican Historical Society.

As you will see elsewhere in the bulletin, now that the Archbishop has issued the mandate for the next Diocesan three-year Synod, we have scheduled the election of our parish Synod representatives for 19 March.

Then on 6 May, the parish will celebrate the coronation of King Charles III! Parishioners are invited to watch the historic ceremony that evening in the Guild Room over dinner. The wardens will form a committee of some parishioners to plan a wonderful party. Put the date in your diary now, and start looking out your tiaras! More details later.

Parish Council has also taken steps to ensure that the security of our buildings and personnel working on the site is fully protected; a key register will be created so we know who has access to the church, hall and vicarage, and the number of keys signed out will be strictly limited.



ICON OF THE TEMPTATION OF JESUS

The icon on the cover of today's Worship Bulletin illustrates Christ's temptations and contains elements of his battle to resist the tempter. There are several variations of this icon. A popular version that has been chosen for today, is a Russian icon that shows the Baptism of Jesus with scenes of his temptation illustrated around the borders and background. It is an icon made of egg tempera on a gold background with gold engravings, but particularly it tells a story that is important for all Christianity.

Many of you will know that the Temptations of Christ is a biblical narrative telling an interesting and moral story about Satan's attempt to deflect Jesus from his true mission. According to the Gospels of Matthew (4:1-11), Luke (4: 1-13) and Mark (1:12-13), Satan appeared to Christ during his isolation in the Judean desert after being baptized by John in the river Jordan. Jesus fasted for 40 days and nights and became physically exhausted. The devil took advantage of this and tried to tempt Jesus. First, the devil, as shown in the upper left-hand corner of the icon, tells Jesus that if he were the Son of God, he could turn stones into bread. Secondly, the devil took Jesus up to the top of the Temple, seen at the top of the right-hand corner and suggested he throw himself off the top to prove God would save him. Thirdly, the devil showed Jesus the nations of the world as seen in the background of the icon, and promised glory if he would bow down and worship him. These three vices - hedonism, egoism, and materialism - were refused by Jesus. From this we can conclude that as Jesus refused these vices, there is a lesson for us to also overcome evil when we are tempted.

As an interesting aside, the Empress Theodora of Byzantium brought about the definitive restoration of icons to the Orthodox church in 843CE with a procession of icons to the Hagia Sophia in Constantinople now Istanbul. This event is known as the 'Triumph of Orthodoxy.' The Orthodox Church continues to celebrate this occasion each year on the first Sunday of Lent. Thus, we can say that the first Sunday in Lent is especially important both in Eastern and Western Christianity.

This is my last Sunday as Acting Vicar and the First Sunday in Lent. May I say first what a privilege it has been to minister to the people of St Bartholomew's during these short three weeks. I will still be here in the parish as one of the honorary associate members of

clergy, and I will enjoy again mostly sitting in the pews for the Sunday mass.

My final message to you is not to ignore or waste Lent this year (or any year). It is a wonderful gift from the great Church year to all of us. Lent reminds us to whom we belong, who is it that loves us without limit, who it is who longs for a closer relationship with us. If you are new to the idea of observing a Lenten discipline, consider taking a small step in one of the three great Lenten disciplines: prayer, fasting, almsgiving. For prayer, perhaps pray daily with an online site, such as the Irish Jesuits' https://www.sacredspace.ie/, or join the Church of England's online Daily Prayer service

https://www.churchofengland.org/prayer-and-worship/join-us-service-daily-prayer, or be part of St Bart's Lenten studies series on Thursday evenings. For fasting, perhaps refrain from eating sugar, or limit the hours you watch TV, or abstain from gossip. For almsgiving, perhaps give generously to the Richmond food centre, or introduce one of the children in your life to the idea of giving to a charity and show how you do it, or give some of your time up to volunteer in our BSL/St Bart's op shop.

It is also important to reflect on what your Lenten prayer, fasting or almsgiving has taught you about what it is that pulls you away from loving God, loving others, and loving yourself well and what it is that draws you closer to God, to others and to your own self by these Lenten disciplines.

I wish you a holy Lent.
