Sermon

Fr Walter McEntee

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. Liturgy Acknowledgements

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ICON OF THE TRANSFIGURATION LENT 2

In the icon on the cover that represents the event of the Transfiguration of Christ, the three Apostles Peter, James and John, see the glory of God. 'And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white' (Mt. 17:1-9).

Peter, in the bottom left corner of the image is kneeling as he realizes that he is truly in the presence of God. Shortly before this event he had professed his belief that Jesus is the Messiah, so his eyes and heart are open to what he is seeing. James, pictured lower right of the icon, has fallen over backwards and with his hands he covers his eyes. Obviously, this experience has a profound effect on him. John in the centre lies under the transfigured Christ. Soon John will be standing directly under Christ as he hangs upon the cross. Jesus is preparing his Apostles for the difficult days ahead by the revelation of the light of the Resurrection. Clearly, the Apostles have been overwhelmed by their experiencing God's glory when they are 'knocked off their feet.'

Christ stands in the middle of the icon looking out at us as he blesses everyone in his midst with his right hand, while holding a scroll that represents the 'good news' of the Gospel, in his left. Christ appears with the brilliance of his glory to prepare and strengthen his disciples spiritually as they are going to be drawn into the difficult ordeal of the cross. Moses and Elijah, shown each side of Christ, on top of mountain peaks, are presented in a more human form than Christ as they symbolize respectively the Law of the Old Testament and the Prophets. All three are seen talking with one another. They also symbolize the dead (Moses) and the living (Elijah). In contrast to the two Prophets who stand motionless, the three Apostles below the feet of Christ are terrified by what happens and are depicted as having fallen in fright. It is interesting to note that just as Moses and Elijah experienced visions of God on mountains – Moses on Mt Sinai and Elijah on Mt Carmel – here they stand again on a mountain sharing in this experience with Peter, James, and John.

In our life as Christians, the Eucharist is the sacrament of the transfiguration. In it we receive a 'taste' of heaven, and we are thus transfigured. Contemplating the *Icon of the Transfiguration of Christ* can give us hope as we await the fulfillment of the time when all creation will be transfigured and filled with the light of Christ.

Stuart Connew, our new Director of Music, is our organist today. A trained teacher, he has been a church organist for more than 50 years. In this time, he has trained children's choirs, adult choirs, school choirs, and chapel choirs ranging from small parish church choirs to a Cathedral choir. A committed Anglican worshipper, he has served as Director of Music in a number of parishes as well as in independent schools. He brings great experience and infectious enthusiasm to the role. He and his wife Karen are already friends of St Bart's, and are looking forward to being part of our parish community.

Election of Synod Representatives

The Archbishop's Mandate has been received for the election of Lay Representatives for the 54th Melbourne Synod; the first session will be held in October. St Bart's needs to elect two Synod representatives and one alternate representative. Nomination papers are available at the back of the church.

Nominations must be given to the Acting Vicar by 9.45am, immediately before Mass, on 12 March. If there are more nominations than vacancies, then an election by secret ballot will be held immediately after Mass on 19 March. If you wish to participate in the election and are not currently on the electoral roll, forms are available from the Hon. Parish Secretary, Dr Muriel Porter.

THE SCRUTINIES

In the early Church, 'the Scrutinies' were searching questions asked during Lent of adults who were converting to the Christian faith and who were to be baptised at Easter. The questions were generally based on the Lord's Prayer and the early Creeds and were concerned at their heart with a person's understanding of who Jesus was and how the Christian life should be led.

The Scrutinies were associated from earliest times with three specific Gospel stories, read on the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent, in which Jesus reveals who he is to those who are searching for meaning and truth in their lives:

- Jesus encountering the Samaritan woman at the well, where he offers Himself as the Living Water (3rd week, John 4. 5-42),
- Jesus healing the man born blind, where Jesus gives himself as the Light of the World (4th week, John 9. 1–41), and
- Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead, where Jesus reveals himself as the Resurrection and the Life (5th week, John 11. 1-45)

The twentieth century saw a revival in both the Catholic and Anglican Churches of the 'adult catechumenate'. This revival involved adults converting to Christianity, with baptism at Easter, after a period of careful instruction and reflection especially during Lent, and all the while integrated into the life of the Church and its liturgy. The existence of the adult catechumenate also prompted people who were already church-goers to a further reflection and deepening of their own faith during Lent.

The three gospels associated with the Scrutinies appear in our lectionary during Lent every third year, Year A, which we are observing in 2023. (They are also optional in the other two years). Over the next three Sundays, we will as a congregation at St Bart's be singing a response at the beginning of the gospel reading and at two points during its reading. This participation will remind us that these gospels are not just stories from the first century but apply directly to us all now. They remind us powerfully of the challenge and the promise of the Christian faith in our lives.
