FROM FR STUART:

RHYTHMS OF PARISH LIFE

We had a lovely celebration for All Saints' and All Souls' Day last week. These two feasts complement each other

Offsetting the rhythms of life is the importance of attending to the temporal affairs of the parish. We will gather for our Annual Meeting after the Sung Mass next Sunday. Thank you to all who have worked hard on preparing their reports, and to our secretary, Muriel Porter, who has compiled them all in a neat book. I look forward to presenting my first report to you at that meeting.

Undergirding all these things is our life of prayer and our corporate celebration of the Eucharist in which we are grafted into Christ, and he lives anew in us. God bless you all.




The Priest acknowledges country and then introduces the Mass and reads the sentence.

The priest sings the opening prayer:

Let us not be afraid to employ what you have given, and multiply our good works from the resources you bestow, so that at the last, you may find us faithful and summon us to share your joy.

We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord. who is one with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

We sit for the readings.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

The response at the end of the reading is:

Hear the word of the Lord, thanks be to God.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

The cantor sings the psalm, and the congregation repeats the response and then joins in the response throughout the psalm.

THE GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

We repeat the acclamation after the cantor and again after the sentence reflecting the theme of the gospel:

Keep awake and be ready: you do not know when the Son of Man is coming.

After the end of the Gospel, the reader says:

The Gospel of the Lord, praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

We sit for the homily.

THE HOMILY

THE CREED

We stand for the creed which is said by all.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is. seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven. was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, all may and became truly human. 1 bow For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

The priest introduces the Greeting of Peace and then says:

The peace of the Lord be always with you. **And also with you.**

OFFERTORY HYMN

During the offertory hymn, the gifts of bread and wine are brought to the sanctuary and the altar is prepared. The altar and the priest are censed.

The thurifer comes into the nave to cense the whole assembly.

PRAYER OVER THE GIFTS

The priest recites the prayer over the gifts, and we respond:


Lord, look upon our worship at your table, and grant that as your Church was born from the pierced side of Christ on the cross, so we may always draw holiness from communion with his risen life.

We make our prayer through Christ our Lord



The Prayer continues


After the elevation of the Host and the elevation of the Chalice, all may bow with the priest in adoration of real presence of Christ. and all join in singing the Acclamation:

Amen.


THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE COMMUNION


THE BLESSING AND DISMISSAL


ST BART'S BOOK CLUB




A Prayer for Ukraine
