

THE LITURGICAL ENVIRONMENT

The liturgical colour for Easter is white. It is a solemn Feast of the Lord as it celebrates the Lord's Passover from his passion and death to resurrected life. Easter Sunday is the greatest day of the Christian year as we celebrate the Lord's resurrection. It begins a season of 50 days and 8 Sundays leading up to Pentecost – the 50th Day.

FROM FR STUART:

POPE FRANCIS

My heart was heavy on Easter Monday when I heard that Papa Francesco had died. May the angels sing him to his rest and he rest in peace. I will share some thoughts in a moment.



EASTER THANKFULNESS AND JOY

But first, what a beautiful and memorable Easter Triduum we enjoyed!

As always, the community of faith gathered in faith and trust to celebrate the passion, death and resurrection of the Lord. In all that was done, we gave praise to the God who brings life and meaning out of confusion, betrayal, defeat, and death.

It was memorable and poignant for me largely because it is the last Holy Week and Easter I will celebrate with you as your parish priest. But it also took on added memories of battling a viral infection all week, reviving enough to last until Good Friday before needing to stop and rest and allow healing from that infection and laryngitis to take place.

I am very grateful to Fr Graeme Brennan who stood in at the last moment. His presiding at the liturgy for Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday enabled the praise of God to continue and a rightful and beautiful celebration of the resurrection to take place. He is a faithful priest with great wisdom and love of the liturgy and this parish. Thanks be to God for him.

MANY THANKS TO MENTION

Thank you also to all who assisted in so many ways to make our celebration of the Easter Triduum so beautiful. Many people help make the liturgies work: readers and servers (particularly Jonathon who was here throughout), those who assist in distributing communion, Craig Douglass standing in for our Director of Music who has been on leave – and choristers Jillian, Prue and Anish. Thanks also to those who came on Holy Saturday morning to clean and prepare the church, Helen who arranged flowers, and all those who organised the catering and hospitality. All these acts and commitments helped enrich the three days. These holy days are an offering of the entire community of faith. Thank you one, and all!

THE SHAPE OF EASTERS' FIFTY DAYS

This Season of Easter is the longest season of the Church's Year lasting for 50 days. Eight days ago, we celebrated the Lord's rising from the dead. Today is the eighth day of Easter. The eighth day symbolises new life. It is the day of resurrection and the new era which unfolds with the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. Many of you will remember Desmond Tutu's exhortation that we are 'people of the resurrection'. That means we live in the promise of the eighth day.

All is made new. With God, nothing is impossible. New life unfolds for us all – both in this life and for eternity – marked by abundance and joy.

What bold claims! To live in that era, that context, lifts us from the dreadful mire of things that might hold us back or trap us into the spirals of political machination recrimination and cruelty. It seems to be increasingly the way of the world as we experience it right now.

FRANCIS' LIVING THE EASTER STORY

Pope Francis crafted an alternative way of seeing God's earth and God's peoples in so many ways – in words and in gestures. He called for a 'revolution of tenderness' in the world. Think of the visit to the island of Lampedusa – where hundreds of refugees land on its shores. It would be like him visiting the detention facilities our country has used over time on Christmas Island or Nauru or Manus Island. The shameful treatment of these vulnerable people – and of immigrants in the United States right now – shows that the world dismisses the poor. It is a culture of indifference, he said. In his final message to the faithful on Easter Sunday last week he said this:

How much contempt is stirred up at times towards the vulnerable, the marginalised, and migrants! On this day I would like all of us to hope anew and to revive our trust in others, including those who are different than ourselves, or who come from distant lands, bringing unfamiliar customs, ways of life and ideas! For all of us are children of God!"

At the core of his time as pontiff he emphasised the mercy and goodness of God and a call to a non-judging character of the Christian. His encyclical *Laudato Si* on the environment will continue to be a strong articulation of our care for the earth.

Our news has been dominated for so many weeks by those who see themselves as 'strong men'. They are also portrayed in the media in this way, thus reinforcing their self-image. But they are no more than bullies. They practice cruelty. They encourage us to be fighting against each other. It is exhausting.

How refreshing it is to see in the news during Easter Week reflections on a man who embodied different values – a faithful priest and bishop of the Church who modelled for us a good way to be a Christian in this life; well done good and faithful Christian, priest, father in God, Francis. May he rest in peace.

A WORD ON PARTINGS

Today is my last Sunday in the parish. I am taking long service leave and accrued leave before I move to Saint Mary's, and I go with a deep thankfulness.

I also leave with a range of emotions. We have had some difficult times in the past short while. Many of you have been hurt and knocked about. We trust that the kindness and goodness of God is stronger than any difficulties and trouble we have faced. Life is stronger than death, to quote Desmond Tutu once again.

Your faithfulness has inspired me. Your welcome and hospitality, your wide interests and kindness to all, whatever they are going through, has energised me and given me hope. These are just some of the things I carry forward as a gift from you and God.

This parish embodies the core values of the Christian community. I well remember one of you telling me how the parish enfolded them into its life during a time of big change in their life. This is the ethos of a good Christian community; not judgement and obsessive 'correctness', but compassion and welcome. You will be in my prayers in the coming months as you discern God's will for the parish.

THE ICON ON THE FRONT OF THE BOOK TODAY

The icon on the front today is one that I am honoured to own. It was an ordination gift from a retired social worker friend of mine. She was a wonderful person who was deeply committed to God and social justice and took up icon writing in her retirement. I love how it captures Jesus inviting Thomas to place his hand in his side. Why? Because Thomas wants to believe. Jesus wants Thomas to believe and to draw him into resurrection confidence and life. So may it be for us. God bless.

GATHERING IN GOD'S NAME

We stand when the bell is rung.

The liturgy commences with the hymn whilst the priest and liturgical ministers enter.

The altar, which symbolises Christ, is reverenced and censed.

The Entrance Hymn is sung antiphonally to evoke the sense that we are sharing the story of the Lord's resurrection with our neighbours.

Cantor: Alleluia. Alleluia. Alleluia. Alleluia. Alleluia. Alleluia.

All then sing:

- O sons and daughters, let us sing! The King of heaven, the glorious King, o'er death today rose triumphing: Alleluia!
- That Easter morn, at break of day, the faithful women went their way to seek the tomb where Jesus lay. Alleluia!
- An angel clad in white they see, who sat, and spake unto the three, 'Your Lord doth go to Galilee'.
 Alleluia!
- That night the apostles met in fear; amidst them came their Lord most dear, and said, 'My peace be on all here.'
 Alleluia!
- When Thomas first the tidings heard, how they had seen the risen Lord, he doubted the disciples' word.
 Alleluia!

- 'My piercèd side, O Thomas, see; my hands, my feet I show to thee; not faithless, but believing be.' Alleluia!
- 7 No longer Thomas then denied; he saw the feet, the hands, the side; 'Thou art my Lord and God,' he cried. Alleluia!
- 8 How blest are they who have not seen, and yet whose faith hath constant been, for they eternal life shall win.
 Alleluia!
- On this most holy day of days, to God your hearts and voices raise in laud and jubilee and praise, Alleluia!







THE LITURGY OF THE WORD


FIRST READING

THE HOMILY

THE APOSTLES' CREED

We stand for the creed which is said by all.

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

We remain standing.
The response to the petitions are:

Lord, in your mercy: hear our prayer.

The response after the prayers for the departed is:

Rest eternal grant to them, O Lord.
 And let light perpetual shine upon them.

and concludes with this prayer:

Almighty God, you have promised to hear our prayers grant that what we have asked in faith we may by your grace receive, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

THE GREETING OF PEACE

The priest introduces the Greeting of Peace and then says:

The peace of the Lord be always with you. **And also with you.**



THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

THE PRESENTATION AND CENSING OF THE GIFTS AND CONGREGATION

The congregation sings the hymn whilst the gifts on the altar are prepared.

Then the altar and the priest celebrant are censed followed by the whole congregation.



The priest sings the prayer over the gifts and we respond:




THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE COMMUNION



JESUS IS RISEN!

Why do I believe in the risen Lord? Not because I have seen him, but because others have told me of him. My parents, teachers, friends, as well as preachers, speakers and writers. Because of them, I believe.

How important it is to proclaim the resurrection of Jesus! We talk about church conflicts and problems, but a simply direct announcement of the resurrection of Jesus is seldom heard, except on pulpits and other such "safe" places. But just as our love for others grows cold when we no longer declare this love to them, so our faith in the risen Jesus gradually fades if we remain silent about him.

We have to keep saying to each other, "The Lord is risen, risen indeed."

It is not enough to say that once or twice. We need to say it to each other constantly so that our faith in the risen Christ can be kept alive and we can live that faith always more deeply.




PLAY TAG IN YARRA



HISTORY

Saint Bartholomew's Anglican Church was opened on 27 October 1926, the foundation stone having been laid on 25 July. This church replaced the earlier Saint Bartholomew's Churches which were on the corner of Swan and Burnley Streets. There are three buildings on the site; the church, a hall in which the Op Shop runs, with the Guild Hall behind and the vicarage.
