

LITURGICAL NOTE

This 'Sunday of the Passion', commonly known as 'Palm Sunday', commences the holiest week of the church's year.

Participating in the whole sequence of the liturgies from today and on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday, we share in Christ's own journey from the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, which we commemorate today, to the experience of the empty tomb on Easter Sunday in a week's time.

The procession of Palms was being observed in Jerusalem from the fourth century and the custom of this church is to process from the memorial garden behind the church, along the breezeway between the church and hall, to the Wayside Cross on Burnley Street before making a formal entry into the church, as one, to celebrate the Eucharist of the Day.

This liturgy is also accompanied by the reading of the Passion Narrative in which the whole of the story of the week is anticipated; hence the name of the day 'Sunday of the Passion'.

The Passion Narrative on Palm Sunday is drawn from one of the synoptic gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke) in a cyclical reading, over three years, of each evangelist's account of the passion of the Lord Jesus Christ. At this liturgy this Passion Narrative is read dramatically ... with a series of voices scattered through the church.

May the Prince of Peace, Jesus the Christ, deepen our love for God and one another through this Holy Week.

THE LITURGICAL ENVIRONMENT

THE LITURGY OF THE PALMS

Palm branches and crosses are distributed to the congregation which gathers in the Memorial Garden.

★ Blessed be God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Blessed be God's kingdom, now and for ever.

Hosanna to the Son of David.

Hosanna to the Son of David.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, the King of Israel.

Hosanna in the highest.

The Lord be with you,

And also with you.

The priest introduces the liturgy. The congregation is invited to hold their palm branches or crosses up to be blessed and sprinkled with holy water.

The Gospel of the Palms is read:

The Lord be with you, and also with you.

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Saint . . .

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Year C: Luke 19:28-40

At the end:

The Gospel of the Lord,

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Fr Stuart delivers a short homily before inviting the congregation to join the palm procession.




Let us proceed in peace. In the name of Christ. A - men.

The procession people follow the priest and liturgical ministers singing the processional chant:

PROCESSIONAL CHANT

The procession leaves the garden and moves along Canterbury, Boyd and Burnley Streets to the forecourt of the Church beside the Wayside Cross whilst singing the processional chant Laudete omnes gentes:







PRAYER AT THE WAYSIDE CROSS

The priest sings the prayer before the procession continues.

We sing the processional hymn as the procession moves into the church:

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD


FIRST READING

The response at the end of the reading is:

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

The cantor sings the psalm, and the congregation repeats the response and then joins in the response throughout the psalm.

SECOND READING


The response at the end of the reading is:

We stand to welcome the gospel.

THE GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

We repeat the acclamation after the cantor and again after the sentence reflecting the theme of the gospel:



Christ became obedient for us to death, even death on a Cross.

Therefore God exalted him and gave him the name above every name. Philippians 2:8-9

THE PASSION OF THE LORD JESUS CHRIST A DRAMATIC READING

We all stand while the Passion is read by three voices and a chorus.

If you tire, do not hesitate to sit for a while.

We kneel at the moment in the Passion when the death of the Lord is recounted.

When the Presider stands, we resume standing for the final verses.

THE HOMILY

We sit for the homily.

THE APOSTLES' CREED

We stand for the creed which is said by all.

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

We remain standing.

Priest: We stand with Christ in his suffering.

Reader: For forgiveness for the many times we have denied Jesus,

let us pray to the Lord,

Lord, have mercy.

For grace to seek out those habits of sin which mean spiritual death, and by prayer and self-discipline to overcome them, let us pray to the Lord,

Lord, have mercy.

For Christian people, that through the suffering of disunity there may grow a rich union in Christ, let us pray to the Lord,

Lord, have mercy.

For those who make laws, interpret them, and administer them, that our common life may be ordered in justice and mercy, let us pray to the Lord,

Lord, have mercy.

For those who still make Jerusalem a battleground, let us pray to the Lord,

Lord, have mercy.

For those who have the courage and honesty to work openly for justice and peace, let us pray to the Lord,

Lord, have mercy.

For those in the darkness and agony of isolation, that they may find support and encouragement, let us pray to the Lord,

Lord, have mercy.

For those who, weighed down with hardship, failure, or sorrow, feel that God is far from them,

let us pray to the Lord,

Lord, have mercy.

For those who are tempted to give up the way of the cross, let us pray to the Lord,

Lord, have mercy.

That we, with those who have died in faith, may find mercy in the day of Christ, let us pray to the Lord, Lord, have mercy.

Priest: Faithful God,

today your Son enters his city to inaugurate the coming of his hour.

Let us share the blessing you bestow on the poor in spirit, that we may truly welcome him as the Saviour of all.

We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

The priest introduces the Greeting of Peace and then says:

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

And also with you.



THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

THE PRESENTATION OF THE GIFTS AND THE CENSING

While the gifts of bread and wine are brought to the sanctuary and the altar is prepared we sing the hymn. The altar and the priest are censed.

The thurifer comes into the nave to cense the whole assembly

OFFERTORY HYMN



The priest recites the prayer over the gifts and we respond:



We stand throughout the prayer.




The Prayer continues to the Sanctus and Benedictus is sung by all to the setting below.

Blessed are those who are called to the banquet of the Lamb.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

Communion is administered to the servers and Eucharistic Assistants.

Feel free to sit until the following invitation to communion.

Come!

Draw near with faith and receive the gifts of God for the people of God! **Thanks be to God!**

Christ is the host at the altar here at Saint Bartholomew's and welcomes all, especially those who are communicant members of other denominations.

If today, you prefer to receive a blessing—please indicate this to the Priest.



The Icon on the Front Cover: Jesus' entry into Jerusalem

Today, Palm Sunday, marks the beginning of Holy Week. The icon on the cover of our Mass booklet illustrates the commemoration of the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem following the miracle of raising Lazarus from the dead. Having anticipated Jesus' arrival and having heard of the miracle, the people gathered in Jerusalem and went out to meet and welcome Jesus (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982).

Jesus is the central figure, depicted seated on the colt of a donkey, blessing the group with his right hand. In his left hand is a scroll, symbolising that he is the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies concerning the Messiah, of the one who has come to redeem us from our sins. The colt was one of the animals deemed unclean according to the law of the time, yet it is symbolic of the inclusion of all peoples of all nations (Ouspensky & Lossky 1982).

On the right, the disciple holding a palm branch accompanies Jesus in his entry to Jerusalem. Also to the upper right is the city of Jerusalem, shown as the walled buildings, with the temple depicted as the building with the dome. The tree in the centre of the icon illustrates the oak tree of Mamre, the tree of life that bridges the gap between the mountain of God and the city of man (J. Paul Getty 2006).

Shown on the left are those who greet Jesus crying, 'Hosannah!' Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord' (Mark 14:1-15-47).

Children, although not pictured in this icon, have placed their garments on the ground before Jesus as tokens of honour. Their child-like simplicity and devotion to Jesus, contrasts with the adults including the Apostles (to the right) who tend to get distracted and start talking in wonder amongst themselves. The twelve Apostles are in deep conversation; good iconographers will show them with expressions of wonder and apprehension. Now Jesus is returning to Jerusalem, the seat of the authorities who are so determined to kill him.

This icon aptly illustrates the glory and identity of Jesus through his halo and the scroll he holds symbolising his wisdom, as he descends the Mount of Olives to the city of Jerusalem (Nes 2004). However, while Christ enters his city in triumph, he can also feel the hostility of those who hail him today and who will crucify him tomorrow.

As we commemorate this auspicious feast day, we may reflect on the fact that Palm Sunday has been commemorated from the time of antiquity and continues to this day in most Western Christian traditions as well as the Orthodox Christian Church. (Dr Alison Asquith)
